



# Colombia: Natural Gas Distribution for Low-income Families on the Caribbean Coast

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## Sector Background

- Natural gas reserves
  - 4.2 trillion cubic feet sufficient to provide 15 years of consumption
- Supportive Regulatory Framework:
  - The Public Utilities Service Law defines the system of crosssubsidies for consumption - allocated through monthly consumer bills
  - No subsidies available for connection charges connection cost determined by regulator – average cost is US\$371
- Distribution companies help finance connection and conversion costs – however, not affordable for urban poor – earn less than legal minimum wage of US\$168
- Promigas, a longstanding IFC client and natural gas distribution company approached GPOBA to expand on a small Dutch OBA pilot

### Project Background

- Over 50% of Colombia's entire population still lives below the poverty line
- Households in the Caribbean (5 to 7 people per hh) with average annual family income of less than US\$168
- Since 1990 Government developed subsidy scheme to provide services to poor hhs (60% of the poor remain without service)
- Cost of switching to gas is high thus low income families rely on dangerous and less efficient energy sources







#### **OBA Scheme**

- Objective: connect 35,000 poor households in the Promigas service area along the Caribbean coast to natural gas services for cooking purposes
- Targeting Population in Strata 1 and 2 as determined by National Planning Department criteria
- Output New Connection and continued service delivery (3 months billing and collection) –stove included
- Private Sector Leveraging: subsidies expected to cover 38% of capital costs; remainder through user contribution, six-year loans by Promigas
- No bidding, as incumbent subsidy based on percentage of regulated connection cost (unit cost)
- Sustainability: customers pay tariffs covering O&M (or are subsidized by FSSRI)
